## **Documentary Filmmaking**

2018 – Ongoing

- Co-directed two short documentaries with Elliot Zepeda Kim.
- First short documentary focused on the nationalization of mines in the Chilean town Lota. It was [published by the NGO Procultura](#) and spotlighted by the Chilean Ministry of Culture, Arts, and Heritage on Chile's National Heritage Day in 2020.
- Conducted interviews and helped collect footage for a second documentary (in process) on the community of Chileans exiled in the Netherlands following the 1973 coup d'état. Interviewed 25+ Dutch-Chilean exiles about their changing ties to Chilean politics over the course of the democratic transition and the 2019 social unrests.
